

Background

Operation American Dream is an IRS-recognized 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that will be launching this December. Dear esteemed members of the board:

I am writing on behalf of the American Cancer Society and its signature fundraising event, Relay For Life, to request permission to host the 2016 Relay for Life of Winter Park in the West Meadows of Winter Park, located off of N. New York Avenue on Saturday April 30th, 2016 from 12:00pm-10:00pm.

To provide a little background: through the vehicle of Relay For Life, the American Cancer Society has been able to save over 1.5 million lives from cancer related deaths since 1991. We do this by funding research, education efforts, advocacy efforts, and services right here in the community. Unfortunately, although we have been a part of every major cancer-related research breakthrough in the past 100 years, there is still more work to be done to find a cure for cancer, once and for all.

Through Relay For Life, communities are offered a chance to join the fight against cancer by mobilizing in our global grass roots movement. Individuals from around the community volunteer countless hours to lead our event of teams, comprised of individuals from all walks of life: teams of churches, schools, businesses, healthcare, friends or family – all work together over the course of one fundraising season to raise funds for our live saving initiatives. These same volunteers form the event planning committee. One of the many unique features of Relay For Life is that it is planned and lead, in its entirety, by volunteers. The event planning committee gives teams an opportunity every month to come together to learn about cancer throughout the event season. It all culminates in the Relay For Life event, itself, which usually takes place in the Spring.

Relay For Life, an event that takes place around a designated walking area (a track), is the celebration of the survivors in our lives – it gives us an opportunity to celebrate the ones who are winning their battle with cancer, and remember those we have lost. Relay For Life does this in several ways: first, we open the event with ceremonies intended to honor those who are still with us. We invite survivors, all wearing purple t-shirts like badges of honor, to walk a lap around the “track” together to celebrate another year of defeating the disease. Their caregivers are then invited to take a lap with them. The event teams set up tents around the “track” and host fundraisers at their “campsite” – the fundraisers usually take the place of food or commemorative items to celebrate survivorship. The event has inspirational entertainment for a large portion of the event, which could include school or church groups from around the area, or local entertainers. Teams continue to walk the track in effort to draw awareness around fighting cancer.

Finally, at dusk, we lower the lights for our Luminaria Ceremony – a very meaningful time of the night where we light candles to honor or memorialize all those we have known to fight cancer. The event ends with this meaningful statement, inviting everyone to do what they can to fight cancer, year round.

This is where we need your help. Each Relay For Life event strives to select a venue that is representative of the community of which it serves. For Winter Park, we feel that the West Meadows is at the heart of the community. Visible, central, it is ideal to suit our purpose.

Details and logistics around the event include:

- **TIME FRAME:** We are looking for Saturday April 30th with the opportunity to begin setting up the event at 8am. The event, itself, would start at 12:00pm and end at 10:00pm, with cleanup lasting until approximately 11:00 pm. Sound would be cut off at 10:00pm.
- **INFRASTRUCTURE:** We would setup an infrastructure that includes and visible in the map below:
 - o Stage and sound equipment- Music will face Park Ave.
 - o Track: Using the sidewalks and grass area per the map below
 - o Restrooms
 - o Stadium lighting and generators
 - o Tents and campsite materials (i.e. decorations, tables, chairs, crockpots, etc.) to be weighted down, not staked down
 - o Décor and signage visible from the road
- **PARKING:** We would utilize parking in the immediate area, including the parking for the American Cancer Society office on N. New York Avenue.
- **ATTENDANCE:** We would expect an attendance of approximately 200-300 individuals of all ages.
- **RELAY FOR LIFE TEAMS:** We had 29 teams participate in 2015.
- **FAMILY EVENT:** Relay For Life is a family event, we do not permit alcohol.
- **FENCED-IN AREA:** to prevent people from going into train tracks
- **SURROUNDING BUSINESSES:** We would work with the surrounding businesses in the area for opportunities of exposure for their establishments.
- **EVENT INSURANCE:** We carry insurance with up to \$1 million coverage, and take security and safety seriously, establishing safety guidelines for all of our participants.
- **OPEN INVITATION:** We invite all local cancer survivors to participate in the walk – we do not charge entry or registration to participate.
- **WE ARE A NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATION:** We are a 501c3, recognized by the IRS.

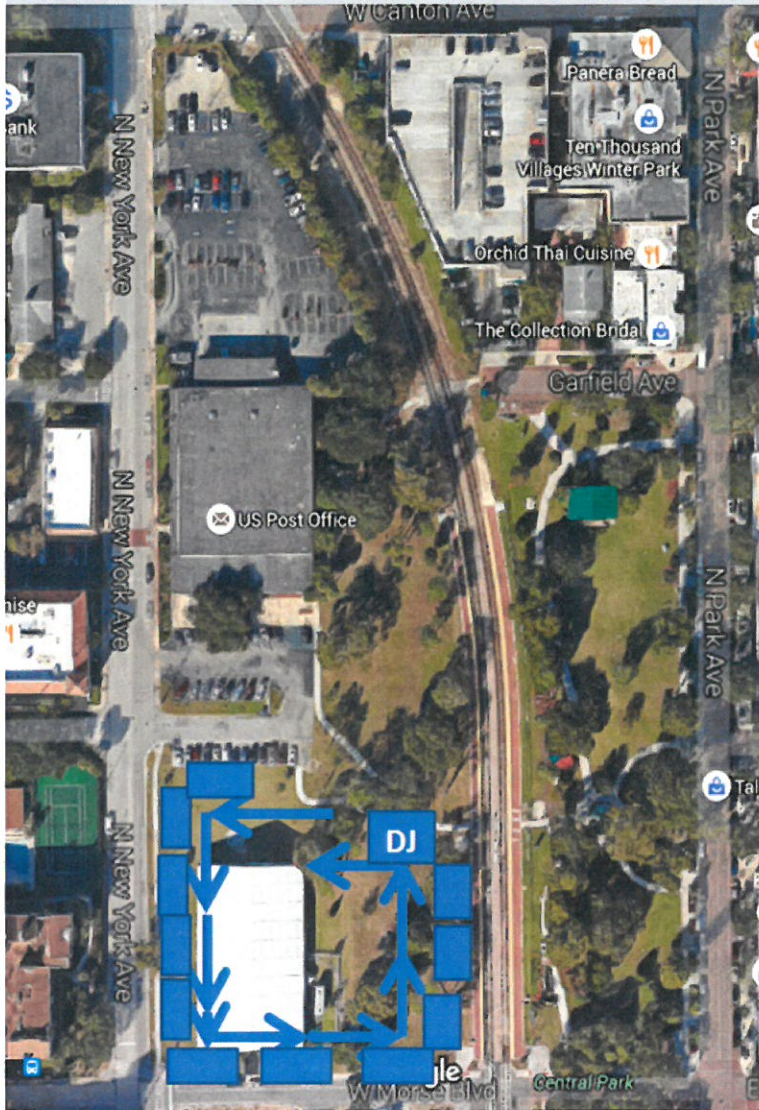

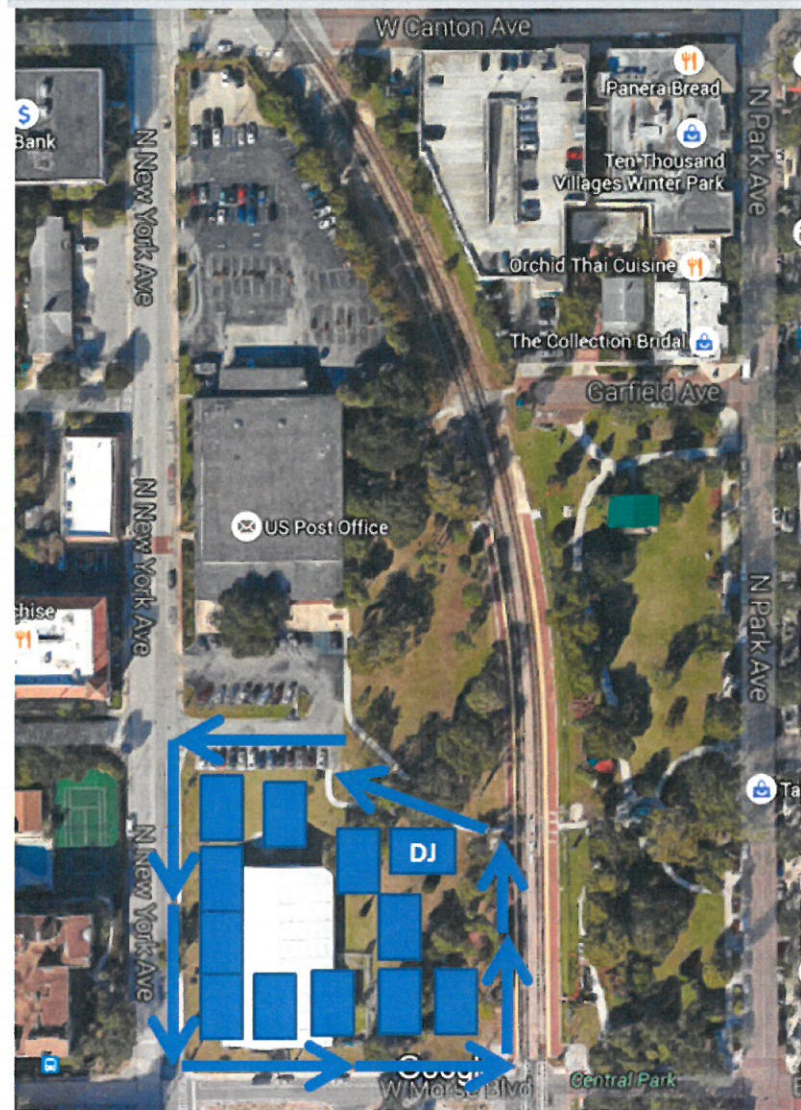

Requested Action

Consideration of a resident request to install game exchange boxes in a few city parks. These would provide a box, like a newspaper box, that park guests could use to exchange games.

Applicable Rules

Staff Recommendation

While the idea of placing Game Exchange Boxes in city parks sounds simple and there are precautions that staff would like to take before allowing the program to be initiated. As with any unproven issue Staff would prefer that an experimental site be approved by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board prior to installation in other parks. Staff recommends that a Game Exchange Box be installed in one of the following parks; Phelps Park, Dinky Dock Park or Ward Park. After the Game Exchange Box has proven that it serves the public as a safe, clean and healthy amenity to the park only then will other sites be considered. Central Park would not be a consideration for a Game Exchange Box. Approval from FDOT must be obtained before installation in or on the SunRail platform.

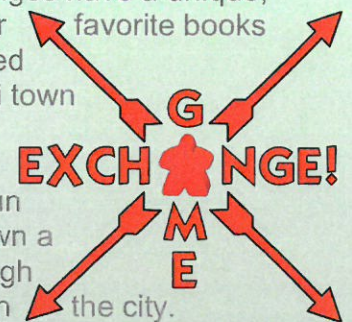

In August, residents near N. Park Ave experienced a shift in their community when two neighbors were involved in a controversial dispute. Consequently, the sidewalks, once busy with people walking their dogs at dusk after work, were empty and the tone of Villa View/Dixie Terrace seemed changed forever. As a direct result, Liam (10) and Claire (8) Goodowens came up with a program designed to return a sense of community to the neighborhood. In a happy coincidence, Vision Winter Park was hosting its first workshop with Peter Kageyama. The two day event introduced participants to how people across the world express their love for their cities. The second day of the workshop focused on specific exercises exploring FUN. "What can you do for the residents and visitors to your city so they have fun?" "Would enhancing the experience in your city through something fun instill civic pride?" During this workshop a \$500 grant was offered to the group who came up with the most popular idea. The children's Game Exchange Box and Winter Park Family Game Night concept was pitched and overwhelmingly supported by the participants to be the recipient of the grant. "I LOVE it! I can't wait to return to Winter Park for game night and to enjoy the game box!" were Kageyama's parting words. Since then, the children have been quite busy bringing their idea from their family room to the conference rooms of corporate sponsors and the meeting rooms of their civic partners. They are proud to participate in city government and are eager to do their part to add joy and a sense of community to Winter Park.

In the simplest of terms, The Game Exchange Box program runs exactly like a Little Free Library, of which there are at least 3 in various parks in Winter Park, and over 250,000 worldwide. "A Little Free Library is a 'take a book, return a book' free book exchange. The book exchanges have a unique, personal touch and there is an understanding that real people are sharing their favorite books with their community. These aren't just any old books, this is a carefully curated collection. The Library itself is a piece of neighborhood art that acts like a mini town square." When designing the Game Exchange concept, Liam remarked that "Little Free Libraries supply items that create an individual experience. We want to promote community and fun. We want people to share their favorite fun experiences with friends and family." Winter Park residents have already shown a fervent response of support for a program like The Game Exchange Box through their diligent stewardship and patronage of the many Little Free Libraries within the city. Based on the strong similarities of the programs, the FAQ page at LittleFreeLibrary.org is a great help.

The original boxes for the program are repurposed newspaper machines donated by The City of Winter Park in conjunction with the Vision WP grant. These bins, having been previously placed throughout the city, have already been approved for functionality and appearance.

Liam and Claire feel that the boxes can serve three different roles depending on the location.

COMMUNITY BOX – This box is placed in a destination location for all the residents of the city creating equal opportunity for access. As of October 10, 2015, the Winter Park Public Library has joined the ranks of community partners supporting the children’s efforts. They are in the process of finalizing a date for the installation at the library.

VISION BOX – This box is placed in a location that has higher visibility for non-residents and thus brings a higher profile for the city and its support for a unique program that promotes nothing but people having fun with one another. During the workshop, the participants all agreed that proximity to Winter Park’s Train Station / Sun Rail would be ideal.

NEIGHBORHOOD BOX – This box is placed specifically in a neighborhood park or in a mini-park. The original objective of the program was centered on this type of neighborhood box. Ideally, these boxes will be the most unique and will serve as a symbol that the residents supporting the box are invested in a sense of community and a continued climate of good will and collaboration.



Headquartered in Maitland, with 4 brick and mortar stores, Cool Stuff is the largest provider of board games second only to Amazon. Their sponsorship includes placing donation boxes at all of their Central Florida locations helping to ensure the boxes will stay stocked. They have also graciously donated a large amount of new games to place in each of the inaugural boxes. Additionally, they will be promoting the program on their web site and partners’ web sites each reaching over 100,000 patrons. Finally, Cool Stuff will be playing a role at Winter Park’s 1st Annual Family Game Night.

Dear John,

Samantha Goodowens reached out to both Shay Silver and I over the weekend to discuss her children's home school project to install a 'game exchange box' at several locations throughout the City. Included in that list of locations is the Villa View park, a passive neighborhood park on the corner of North Park Avenue and Oaks Boulevard. As you know I live directly across the street from the park and was instrumental in getting the park approved several years ago as a "low maintenance/ passive park". The low

maintenance requirements of the park were instrumental in achieving approval because our neighborhood does not have a neighborhood association to participate in any upkeep of the park or related activities.

Having said that I was briefed on the Goodowens' homeschool project and read the children's flyer. I looked at the idea from the perspective of a mother, an educator with over 20 years experience, and a property owner directly across the street from the park. My initial sentiments when you e-mailed to inform me of the project was that a passive neighborhood park is not an appropriate location for a child activity that would require constant monitoring and upkeep in order to make it successful. The Goodowens children's concept is based on the assumption that the general public would bring (exchange) games in good condition and that game parts are properly disinfected.

After consideration, I am clearly against placing the 'game exchange box' at Villa View park for the following reasons:

(1) The idea is not in line with the low maintenance requirement of the park, which was a basis for approval. We have a game exchange at the school where I teach. It requires the management and supervision of an adult to inspect and check the games in and out because the reality is that people do not always return things and/or they come in with missing parts.

(2) There are security risks associated with placing a box targeted at children, where anyone can leave anything (e.g. contaminated candy or even drugs). I was surprised to learn that the City of Winter Park is open to putting their stamp of approval with their logo to a box that could possibly contain un-vetted items left by strangers. Please read the article published in the New York Times about marijuana packaged to look like candy.

(3) There is a burden on adjacent property owners to clean up discarded games/pieces and deal with additional traffic and parking issues should the idea become as popular as the Goodowens are asserting. An example of this has been the 'Geocash' box that was placed at the Villa View park several years ago without permission. The Villa View geocash box was advertised on the internet and to this day I still have to deal with inquiries and issues related to this well meaning idea. In addition most people that come to find the geocash box don't even live in Winter Park.

(4) The 'game exchange box' could become the 'drug exchange box'. As you know John, I spent several months working with the City of Winter Park Police and Parks and Recreation Department to put an end to drug activity at Villa View park. To my knowledge two arrests and one apprehension of teenage boys were made for drug possession. Villa View park was being used as a drop off and pick up location for illegal drugs. What I learned in that situation is that even the placement of a bush in the wrong location could promote unwanted activity. After that long and stressful series of events, the last thing I want to do is to introduce the perfect, unsuspecting place for another drug drop off point. The 'game exchange box' is the perfect unsuspecting place for dropping off and picking up drugs in the middle of the night. I am clear that I do not want to revisit this problem again.

So, although as an educator and a mother I think the Goodowens children's efforts and ideas are endearing, I cannot support it. However, if the City would like to involve themselves in a child's school project at this level, I would encourage the City and Goodowens to do a market test of their concept at the public library or train station. At least these are locations where the City can allocate personnel to monitor/manage the 'game exchange box' and take full responsibility for the activities surrounding it.

Lastly, if there are any additional requests for changing or adding elements to the Villa View park, please provide at least a 30 day notice.

The City does have park designations such as "Neighborhood," "Community," "Linear," and "Special Purpose". They are based upon the area and demographic that they serve. In the case of Villa View Park it is considered a mini-park. A party in the park would not require any fees as long as it was for a neighborhood resident. We would ask that you let the Parks and Recreation Department know so that we can be aware of the event and service the park accordingly. The port-a-lets would be up to the discretion of the resident.

Villa View Park is a neighborhood park and is operated under the direction of the Parks and Recreation Department, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and the City Commission.

Samantha,

I am sorry for your frustration. In all reality our Department is the only approval you would need to hold an event in the park unless it was something out of the ordinary, then the Parks and Rec Advisory Board would get involved.

Michelle and Shay are very protective over the park and take their responsibility as neighbors seriously. They are very vocal about the parks use but ultimately the use of the city park lies with our Department.

At the Board meeting you will be provided time to present your idea to the Board members and other people may speak for or against the idea.

Staff is going to recommend approval of a test run of the Game Exchange in one of our parks, Phelps, Dinky Dock or Ward Park. The performance will be evaluated over several months and expanded if approved. However, installation in Central Park will not be an option. I am also concerned that placing a box on the SunRail platform will need specific approval from FDOT which may be difficult to obtain.

Please do not get discouraged. Things like this just sometimes have to really be sold before everyone develops a level of comfort.

Regarding the Game Exchange Box Proposed for Villa View Park, designed by Shay Silver and installed by the Public Works Dept of Winter Park, Let it be known that two minors Liam(10) and his sister Claire (9) Goodowen(residents of WP on North Park Ave across the street from Villa View Park) and their parents, and Shay Silver ... that The following meeting has/did take place to my knowledge and understanding to the best of my recollection:

On Sunday, Oct 18,2015, about noon, to 1:00 pm. I met with Samantha Goodowen and her husband and their two children Liam(10)and Claire(9) and their two dogs to discuss the children's Home Schooling Community Project that will include an unmonitored Game Exchange Box Proposed for Villa View Park, (Park Ave at Oaks Blvd). This school project will add to their graded qualifications as two Home Schooled children.

They received a \$500.00 grant from the Envisioning Process/winter Park.
They received as many former Park Ave newspaper boxes as they wanted as dispensers for their Exchange Games Boxes.
They received the WP Peacock (seal of approval) to b placed on each Box.

They received one multi- thousand dollar current Bronze newspaper box as found in multiples on Park Ave to place in their front yard as a Game Exchange Box. The children found that they could not maintain it even at this close proximity to their front door. They also didn't like the potential traffic of strangers generated by the Box. They tried to give the Bronze Box back to the City, which refused it, and then proceeded to give the Box to an unknown party for an unknown use. As Public Property, this action around the City's box is without precedence and should b called into question for the benefit of the greater populace. Even scrap metal revenue could be included in our City Budget if the boxes were sold.

A Website <http://www.gamerexchangeBox.org/game> exchange Box/ Game exchange.html..... designed by the two children is being launched nationally with the site identifying WP Box locations filled with the retail games of COOL STUFF, an Internet company.

The games are not vetted nor are they cleaned before being returned to the Box after use. Nor are donated games vetted or cleaned which are also part of the exchange program. Nor is any food or extraneous material vetted. The boxes are available 24 hours a day to the children and any adults.

Liam and Claire only verbally promised that Villa View Park would not appear on the website along with the other WP Locations. They offered no Legally binding assurance of their promise. They are taking no legal responsibility Nor is this project insured for liabilities that may b incurred. The TROGAN Horse is being introduced to the City as a "gift"? This leaves us on many nebulous levels. Just how responsible is the City of WP for the actions of two children who are trying to qualify for a Home School project ? This is overreaching. And remember the multiple Boxes the children are Already afforded by the City to be scattered City wide... All are unaccountably unmonitored.

The neighbors of Villa View have been shanghaied for hours and hours of their personal family and work time by the two children's Home School project that goes for qualifying them personally for their grade as a community project. PLEASE !!!!! this is unfair use of our personal resources and time that we use for our own children and their projects for school, places of worship And community projects of their own choosing. Please DO NOT place this EXCHANGE BOX IN VILLA VIEW PARK. We have no more time to give to these two children n their Home Schooling Project or the City's evolvment . Don't ask!

A Retail Company called COOL STUFF accessed on the Internet is driving the project financially. They Are donating two to three thousand Dollars of unvetted children's games for the boxes and are advertised with the blessing of the Winter Park Peacock Seal. COOL STUFFS intentions and advertising and publicity and consequent revenues and public identity with WP have not been Legally addressed. Their Contractual Agreement (or lack thereof) with the City is not spelled out nor have the Citizens approved these arrangements.

The children talked of putting a surveillance camera in the boxes with no input from neighbors, Citizens or the City or the Parks Dept Or the Legal Dept or the Envisioning Process, etc. This is irresponsible!!!! PRIVACY is at issue here in our neighborhood.

Samantha Goodowen offered that Villa View was getting the Box " like it or not" .This sets a bad precedence for the two children's understanding of Public Process.

There is also NO EXIT PLAN FOR THE BOXES in Villa View or any other location. If the City didn't want their Expensive Bronze newspaper Box back, just how do these two children aim to continually refurbish or remove or relocate the Boxes as neededby themselves???

John -

I don't mean to be a stickler but we have not discussed the program with Commissioner Cooper in any way. She has not reached out to us and has no idea other than that Michelle Rodriguez is very vocal about only one park. I feel her letter is ill-informed and I don't want to embarrass her at the board meeting next Wednesday. The children would be happy to meet with Commissioner Cooper and if she still feels the same way, perhaps she should come to the meeting in person.

Additionally, I have spoken with the WP Police Dept. Crime Analysis division. I was worried for my family since we live so close to the park and having been told by Michelle and Shay the dangerous elements the park is already attracting, and was told, in no uncertain terms that the park has only had 6 calls since 2013 all of which were from Michelle. 1 was about drug paraphernalia with no individuals associated and 1 was regarding 2 teenage boys with 1 beer (this being the only call in 2015). The others were people that Michelle didn't recognize and were either not participating in criminal activity in any way or were gone by the time the police came. While it is not against the law, Michelle even felt compelled to call the police when boys were skateboarding in the park. MANY more calls were made about Phelps Park AND the public library - both locations that Shay and Michelle urged us to use.

In any event, this has become her business because you asked us to reach out to her and you alerted her of our initial intent. Since then we have removed our request to put the program at Villa View so I am asking that you set her at ease to this regard. I'm not sure why she is so aggressive, but I would very much like to remove her fervent negativity from the lives of my children who have been nothing but embraced by The City and everyone they have met in regards to this program.

Based on the letter below, I am going to reach out to the people who run the Little Free Library program so they can be on hand on Wednesday night to dispel the myths that are being propagated about drugs with relationship to an exchange box. Additionally, please know that at the meeting, as discussed with Dori Stone, we will be communicating the Code of Conduct that will be on each box, as well as our family's contract with The City of Winter Park in terms of maintenance etc. To term the box unmanned and other such inciteful language is bothersome to the forward momentum of something that is really meant to bring happiness and joy.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WINTER PARK, FLORIDA, AMENDING ARTICLE II OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CHAPTER 70, PEDDLERS, HAWKERS AND SOLICITORS, ARTICLE 1, IN GENERAL, BY CREATING A NEW SECTION 70-10, TO REGULATE OUTDOOR AND STREET PERFORMANCES; PROVIDING FOR DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR PROHIBITIONS AND UNLAWFUL ACTS RELATING TO STREET PERFORMERS; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY, CODIFICATION, CONFLICTS AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it is the primary concern and interest to the City of Winter Park, Florida, to vigilantly protect and preserve the quality and historical and cultural ambience of the Central Business District of the City; and

WHEREAS, upon consideration, the City Commission of the City of Winter Park, Florida has determined that the time, place and manner restrictions upon conduct on the streets of the City of Winter Park will be effective for the purposes intended, and studies of traffic patterns of congestion upon the streets have indicated that allowing performers during certain times would not adversely affect the cultural and historical ambience of the City; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Court, in *Horton v. City of St. Augustine, Florida*, 272 F.3d 1318 (11th Cir. 2001), upheld a city’s right to regulate street performers in a limited area in a city’s historic business district; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Winter Park hereby finds that this Ordinance serves a legitimate government purpose and is in the best interest of public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Winter Park, Florida.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF WINTER PARK:

Section 1. Chapter 70, Peddlers, Hawkers and Solicitors, Article 1, In General, is hereby amended to create a new Section 70-10, labeled “Regulation of Street Performers”, to read, in its entirety, as follows:

Sec. 70-10. Regulation of street performers.

Intent. The City Commission of the City of Winter Park hereby ratifies, approves and adopts all of the foregoing predicate “Whereas” clauses. The City Commission

of the City of Winter Park finds that the existence in the City of Street Performers, as hereinafter defined, in a certain area of the City, would interfere with the public health, safety, and welfare of the pedestrian traffic, including residents and tourists by, among other things, attracting audiences which congest the prohibited public area. The City finds that the existence of the Street Performers in the prohibited public area further would adversely affect the City's interests in the aesthetics in a city with a unique historic downtown district and would adversely affect the interest of residents and the regulated, code compliant businesses and museums in the enjoyment of peace and quiet in their homes, businesses and museums. Also, the City finds that the existence of the Street Performers in the prohibited public area would pose a safety risk to the public and passers-by by congestion and clutter in this area of Winter Park. Therefore, it is the intent of the City to prohibit the Street Performers from performing in the prohibited public area of the City of Winter Park but to permit them to have access to reasonable alternative avenues of communication throughout the City.

(b) *Definitions.* The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

(1) *Perform* means acting, singing, playing musical instruments, pantomime, mime, magic, dancing, artistry or the sale of visual art and wares, which means drawings or paintings applied to paper, cardboard, canvas, cloth or to other similar medium when such art is applied to the medium through the use of brush, pastel, crayon, pencil, or other similar object, and the creation, display and/or sale of crafts made by hand or otherwise.

(2) *Prohibited activity* means any activity involving spray painting or use of aerosols or propellants, including air pressure, to spray or apply any liquid; and the use of fire.

(3) *Prohibited public area* means the pedestrian accessed public areas of the Central Business and Hannibal Square Districts along Park Avenue from Fairbanks Avenue to Swoope Avenue, and along New England Avenue from Park Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue including the area within fifty (50) feet of the public right of way of Park Avenue and New England Avenue on the public lanes, streets or thoroughfares and including the area known as Central Park, the Winter Park train station and the public property at what is known as the Farmer's Market and the Winter Park Historical Association located at 200 West New England Avenue. Exceptions to the above stated prohibited public area shall include City approved or authorized events and activities.

(4) *Street Performers* as used in this section means individuals who perform, as defined herein, on the streets or public property of the City of Winter Park.

(5) *Other public areas* means public streets, rights-of-ways, sidewalks, parks, playgrounds, and all public ways except those portions of the streets and roadways intended for use by vehicular traffic within the City of Winter Park.

(c) *Prohibition.* No street performers may perform in the prohibited public area. No Street Performer may perform a prohibited activity anywhere in the City of Winter Park.

(d) *Permitted performance.* Street Performers may perform in all public areas of Winter Park except that area of the Central Business District along Park Avenue from Fairbanks Avenue to East Webster Avenue and within fifty (50) feet of that section of Park Avenue on the public lanes, streets or thoroughfares.

(e) *First Amendment zone.* Notwithstanding the above provisions, the City Manager or his designee shall designate an area of no less than one quarter acre within the prohibited public area to serve as a location where First Amendment activities will be permitted. The location of the First Amendment zone may change to accommodate specific public events. A map of the First Amendment area shall be provided upon request.

(f) *Exceptions.* A Street Performer shall not perform in a manner that interferes with the visibility of any motorist, or at or near intersections or passages in a manner which interferes with the sight distance of any motorist traveling on or entering any thoroughfare in the City, or in violation of any other City code.

(g) *Penalties.* Offenses under this section shall be punishable as provided in section 1-7 of this Code.

Section 2. Severability. If any section or portion of a Section of this Ordinance proves to be invalid, unlawful, or unconstitutional, it shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force, or effect of any other Section or part of this Ordinance.

Section 3. Codification. It is the intention of the City Commission of the City of Winter Park, Florida, and it is hereby ordained that the provision of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinance of the City of Winter Park, Florida; that the Sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered to

accomplish such intention; that the word, "Ordinance" may be changed to "Section", "Article", or other appropriate word.

Section 4. Conflicts. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage and adoption.
