Winter Park is the city of arts and culture, cherishing its traditional scale and charm while building a healthy and sustainable future for all generations.



As we wind down 2018 and gear up for the New Year, I want to share a few highlights from this past fiscal year that your city staff and City Commission have accomplished:

- Acquired 50+ acres of the Howell Creek wetlands for development of a natural park.
- After our first full year in operation since the renovation, the Winter Park Golf Course continues to exceed expectations.
- Undergrounded 5.7 miles of overhead power lines.
- Began to underground the transmission and distribution power lines along Fairbanks Avenue from
 - Harper Street to Interstate 4.
- Opened newly renovated Fire Station 64 on Howell Branch Road.
- Began Phase 1 of the fiber backbone project to connect all city facilities.
- Added three properties to the Historic Registry.
- Held a Grand Re-Opening for the renovated Winter Park Tennis Center, and implemented a new management model to improve maintenance and revenues.
- Completed the first three phases of the Denning Drive Multi-Use Trail improvements from Orange to Canton avenues.
- Added approximately \$750,000 to General Fund Reserves.
- Held our millage rate to the same rate for the 11th straight year.

- Celebrated the city's arts & cultural organizations by hosting its inaugural "Weekend of the Arts" event.
- Planted approximately 560 trees in parks and city rights of way.
- Planted a 20-foot Red Cedar in Central Park to serve as the city's new official holiday tree that will be lit for the first time at the Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony on Friday, December 7.
- Said goodbye to the Rachel D. Murrah Civic Center with a special "We Still Do" event that commemorated the civic center's historic significance and became Winter Park's largest public wedding vow renewal ceremony.
- Launched the new Family Fun Program to reconnect our families and parks with fun recreational activities.
 - Hired three new directors for the Fire-Rescue, Parks & Recreation, and Planning & Community Development departments.

These are just a few of the successes your city has reached in just 12 months, and we look forward to celebrating many more in the upcoming year. We are fortunate to be able to not just enjoy what we have inherited, but to also build upon our founder's vision and improve Winter Park for generations to come.

Fairbanks Avenue undergrounding project

The City of Winter Park and Duke Energy[®] have been working together on plans to underground the existing overhead power lines along the south side of Fairbanks Avenue from I-4 to one block east of Orlando Avenue (U.S. Highway 17-92) at Harper Street. The existing poles carry both distribution lines and transmission lines, owned and operated by Duke Energy—along with other utilities such as cable and telephone, which are owned by other providers.

The city secured a grant from the Florida Department of Transportation to fund this undergrounding project. The project will take place in five phases, with each phase impacting traffic flow and access to various



businesses along Fairbanks Avenue throughout the process. Upon completion, undergrounding the overhead transmission and distribution lines will create the following positive, long-term benefits:

- » Better protection against high winds during storms
- » Enhanced visual appeal
- » Facilitate marketability of properties

impacts to traffic and access to business

- » A majority of the work will be performed during evening hours.
- » The south lane of Fairbanks Avenue will be closed during active construction, and will reopen as each construction phase is completed.
- » The permanent new pavement will not be finished until fall 2019 when all the construction phases are complete.

A comprehensive traffic plan has been developed and the city is working directly with businesses to identify alternative access during periods of construction when access from Fairbanks Avenue will be closed.

During construction, the existing middle lane of Fairbanks Avenue, which is currently used as a left turn lane, will be used as an east-bound travel lane. There will be no left turns from Fairbanks Avenue permitted during construction.

Pineywood gets upgrades

The city manages two cemeteries in the city limits, Pineywood and Palm. Pineywood Cemetery, located at the corner of Glenridge Way and Lakemont Avenue, has been in existence since the early 1900s like Palm Cemetery.



The city's ownership did not occur until 1970 when it was deeded to the city. Recorded burials date back to the 1890s and a rich history of Winter Park is recorded on the markers with the names of the families who are at rest in Pineywood.

In fall 2018, the city completed the construction of a new office space and renovated the restrooms at Pineywood. These new upgrades will allow for improved service and help further the goal to honor those in its care, and maintain the beauty of the cemetery for its residents, families and generations to follow. cattails

Cattails (Typha sp.) are one of Florida's native aquatic plants that can sometimes become a nuisance in our lakes and waterways. They grow in shallow anchored by wellwater developed root systems, and are characterized by a brown fuzzy cigar-shaped flower that sits atop



a long blade-like stem and resembles a cat's tail. When fully mature, these plants can reach 10-feet tall and can migrate out to deeper water.

Cattail stems and leaves provide excellent nesting and resting habitat for a variety of bird species like ducks and red-winged blackbirds, while the underwater portion of the stem offers a refuge for juvenile fish, salamanders, frogs, and invertebrates. This plant is often used in mitigation sites to help prevent soil from washing away because the root system helps to stabilize soil and effectively guard against erosion. But if left unchecked, the rapid growth of cattails can result in dense plant stands that outcompete other beneficial plant species and can impede navigation and alter water flow.

There has been quite a bit of activity at the intersection of Mizell Avenue and Crosby Way. What is now a booming construction site will very soon be the completed Center for Health & Wellbeing, a state-of-the-art healthy living center focused on improving the quality of life for central Florida. The Center, opening in early 2019, will include the new Peggy & Philip B. Crosby Wellness Center, operated by the Winter Park Health Foundation, as well as medical and clinical offices operated by Florida Hospital, soon to be AdventHealth. Together the partners collaborate on the many Center spaces designed to promote whole-person health.

In conjunction with the construction of the Center for Health & Wellbeing, the city has committed to making the following improvements to connect this new facility with Ward Park:

- » Installation of 10' multi-use sidewalk
- » Updated landscaping and additional lighting
- » Connectivity between adjacent section of Ward Park in addition to other surrounding parks such as Showalter and Cady Way
- » Updates to site amenities such as trash cans, benches and picnic tables along with the addition of a bike service station
- » Multi-purpose lawn area for both passive and active recreational programming use
- » Bricking of Loch Lomond Drive with raised pedestrian crossings to encourage safe driving
