### Service to our community

Serving as an elected official is an honor and a responsibility. Unlike other cities, Winter Park is not divided into districts. We are elected at large, representing each one of you, regardless of your address. As your Mayor, I serve as the Chair of the Winter Park City Commission. Winter Park has a Commission/Manager form of government, which means the City Commission makes decisions and is primarily responsible for setting city policy. It is the responsibility of City Manager Randy Knight, through his staff, to implement these policies and ensure high-quality city services are delivered.

Every year we go through an election process. In 2019, City Commission Seats 3 & 4 are up for re-election. Congratulations to Commissioner Carolyn Cooper who recently retained Seat 3 and will serve for the next three years. Seat 4, currently held by Vice Mayor Pete Weldon, will go through the election process and be determined by voters on Tuesday, March 12. In March 2020, City Commission Seats 1 & 2, and in 2021, the Mayor's seat, will be open for your vote. I encourage you to become more involved in this process, especially younger residents who may believe the time constraints are too burdensome. It is incredibly important to the continued success of Winter Park, that the make-up of our City Commission reflects the composition of our community.

As Mayor, I have been fortunate to have community leaders on both sides, physically and philosophically, that have come together to set an optimistic path forward for our city. It is essential to have a City Commission with a variety of interests and passions, yet hold the common thread of love for

our city. City staff has provided reams of supporting documentation and has implemented our policies and decisions.

In just the past three years we have:

- added park land [55+ acres of Howell Creek]
- undergrounded powerlines [currently working on undergrounding the overhead lines on Fairbanks Avenue between Harper Street & Interstate 4]
- renovated city facilities
  [tennis center, Station 64, Showalter Stadium & golf course]
- improved traffic flow [Lee Road Extension, Denning Drive]
- planted trees [city rights of way and parks]
- invested in our parks [Mead Botanical Garden, Cady Way]


All of these have been done without raising your millage rate and could not have been done without the team you know as your City Commission and city staff. As well, I would like to thank our county, state and federally elected and

appointed officials for their availability. Many of the projects during my tenure as Mayor, are the result of policies, actions and funding resourced from these partners.

Thank you to Pete, Carolyn, Sarah and Greg for your commitment, collaboration and respect for one another, city staff, businesses and most importantly, our residents and neighbors.



The city has been working closely with the design team of the Winter Park Canopy to ensure all elements of the project are achieved and within budget. As with any construction project, there are many factors the city has to consider including inflation, prices of materials and labor costs. The primary library & events center amenities will be constructed within the \$30 million voter-approved bonds.



At the time of writing, a fundraising effort is in place for the additional elements listed below. If fundraising is successful, these amenities will be considered for inclusion in the overall project:

- porte-cochère [covered entryway pavilion]
- rooftop venue
- outdoor amphitheater
- indoor auditorium/theatre

By April 2019, all funding mechanisms should be identified and the City Commission will discuss what elements of the Canopy will be further designed and constructed as part of the project. For the most current updates, please visit winterparkcanopy.org.

### Quiet zones update

The Florida Department of Transportation has updated their schedule regarding the implementation of quiet zones in Winter Park. According to this new timeline, all Winter Park crossings will be quiet zone compliant by August 2019. The entire corridor, including Orlando and Maitland crossings, is expected to be completed by the end of 2019. In quiet zone corridors, train engineers will no longer blow their horns as they approach the railroad crossing intersections. Horns will only be blown at the engineer's discretion and when danger or an emergency arises on the tracks.

# Making events safer

In an ongoing effort to keep our residents and guests safe, the city has installed new bollard bases on New England Avenue between New York and West Park avenues. The bases allow for the use of bollards rather than barricades to close the road to vehicular traffic. These bollards will be used on Saturday mornings during the Winter Park Farmers' Market as well as for other special events that require a street closure in this segment of New England Avenue.

Thank you to the Community Redevelopment Agency, Fleet Maintenance Division, Parks & Recreation Department, Public Works Streets Division, and Winter Park Police Department for continuously looking for enhanced ways to ensure public safety.

# Denning Drive transformed

In October 2017, the city began the Denning Drive Multi-Use Trail Project. This project is transforming Denning Drive from a 4-lane road into an improved corridor that will offer a 10-foot-wide, multi-use trail from Mead Botanical Garden to Webster Avenue; connect neighborhoods and businesses along the route; enhance the pedestrian and bicycle experience.



In February 2019, the city began the final phase between Canton and Webster avenues which should be completed (weather permitting), by the end of April. During the last two weeks of this final phase, Denning Drive will be closed to traffic for the construction of the landscaped median islands, final curbing, installation of irrigation and sidewalks, and repaving of the road. During this phase, please expect delays and use caution when driving in this area.

# Undergrounding power lines along Fairbanks Avenue

Since November 2018, the city and Duke Energy® have been actively working to underground the existing overhead power lines that run along the south side of Fairbanks Avenue from Harper Street (just one block east of U.S. Highway 17-92) to Interstate 4. The existing poles carry both distribution and transmission lines, owned and operated by Duke Energy — along with other lines such

as cable and telephone, owned by other providers.

Phase 1 work began with the installation of a large underground pipe on Harper Street using a microtunnel process. Once fully installed, the overhead cables will be pulled through this pipe protecting it from the outside elements that can cause outages.



The entire project will take place in five phases, with each phase impacting traffic flow and access to various businesses along Fairbanks Avenue throughout the process. Please use caution while driving in this area.

Funded by a grant from the Florida Department of Transportation, this project will create the following positive, long-term benefits:

- Better protection against high winds during storms
- Enhanced visual appeal
- Marketability of properties

#### Farmers' Market turns 40!

The city is proud to announce the Winter Park Farmers' Market 40th Anniversary Celebration will be held **Saturday, May 18**, at **10 a.m.**, just outside the market located at 200 W. New England Ave.



The Winter Park Farmers' Market began when former City Commissioner Jerry Donnelly suggested that the city initiate a Saturday morning market at the train depot. On May 19, 1979, the Farmers' Market opened with approximately eight vendors. Four decades later, the market hosts over 85 vendors with approximately

2,500 visitors per week shopping for diverse kitchen and garden items, from bay leaves and bratwurst to bagels and butterflies. Vendor varieties include plants, flowers, produce, baked goods, organic, locally-grown and consumable products.

# keeping our waterways clean

Buried beneath many of our city streets is an intricate network of filtration technologies that work to clean stormwater runoff before it drains into our lakes. While Winter Park is not a heavily industrialized community, there is a significant amount of litter, grass clippings, leaves, sediment, oil and grease in our underground treatment systems. These uniquely designed



structures capture and remove the solids and debris, leaving the clean water to discharge into the lakes, ultimately improving water quality and habitat for our wildlife species.

In addition to preventing trash from accumulating in the lakes, these underground structures - in combination with street sweeping - are also critical to reducing nutrient pollution in our waterways.
