

Summer 2024 Exhibitions at The Rollins Museum of Art

The Rollins Museum of Art looks forward to debuting four exciting exhibitions for this summer season, opening **May 30, 2024**:

Pathways 2024: The Carlos Malamud Prize returns for its second iteration, in collaboration with the UCF Art Gallery at the University of Central Florida. The competition, which takes place biannually, considers applications by artists who reside in Florida, are beginning their careers, and have not yet had solo exhibitions at a museum or major gallery. The six finalists chosen this year will show a selection of works at both venues. The winner will be awarded a grand prize including a solo exhibition the following fall at UCF. Finalists this year are: Samuel Aye-Gboyin (Ghanaian, b. 1991), Patricia L. Cooke (American, b. 1988), Tenee' Hart (American, b. 1988), Diego Alejandro Waisman (Argentinian American, b. 1979), Fernando Ramos (American, b. 1994), and Clio Yang (Chinese, b. 1997). Receptions at both RMA and UCF will take place May 29 from 5:30-7PM at the Rollins Museum of Art and May 30 from 5-7PM at the UCF Art Gallery. The grand winner will be announced this year at the UCF event.

The Fantastical Mundane: Selections from the Grasset-Linares Collection is an exhibition of 10 paintings that capture Dutch art culture in the 17th century, illustrating the beauty and charm of mundane subjects like flowers, fruits, and the natural terrain.

Critical Reading, an exhibition designed for students and visitors to engage with books as vessels for sharing expertise, focuses on text – whether literally or metaphorically – and how it functions as image and vice versa. These works challenge our preconceptions about the act of reading by pushing experimental methods of communication and comprehension, asking viewers to take an active role in making sense of a text, even those that are designed to provoke and confound.

A rotational exhibition, *What's New? Recent Acquisitions*, features a diverse group of newly acquired works to the permanent collection at the Rollins Museum of Art. This season, we are pleased to present works by Tatsuo Miyajima, James Siena, and Rose B. Simpson among others.

We also encourage visitors stop by between **April 13 – May 12** to view our **2024 Studio Art Senior Exhibition**, **As We Are**, showcasing multidisciplinary work produced by graduating studio art majors Catarine Marchione, Elizabeth McBride, Emily Rambarran, and Lah-che Williams. As a statement of self-acceptance, discovery, and compassion towards the artists' unique identities, **As We Are** reflects on how childhood experience has shaped each artist. Highlighting their different experiences with anxiety and fear, romantic love, grief, and expression of identity, each of the works exhibited functions as the embodiment of distinct research practices developed by the students throughout their last year of study. There will be an exhibition preview on **April 12 from 5:30-7:00PM**, and a panel discussion on **April 23 at 12:30PM**.

Pathways 2024: The Carlos Malamud Prize

This exhibition is a collaborative partnership between the Rollins Museum of Art and the UCF Art Gallery at the University of Central Florida that celebrates and supports emerging professional artists working in Florida. Juried by an external panel of professionals from various areas of the art world, this edition of the exhibition features a group of artists with diverse practices creating shown both at venues, opportunities for engagement with two of the area's major academic constituencies and their surrounding communities. The

selection includes a variety of media, themes, scales, and approaches, showing a wide breadth of perspectives and experiences. The winning artist of *Pathways 2024: The Carlos Malamud Prize* will receive a \$10,000 cash prize, a solo exhibition at the UCF Art Gallery in the fall of 2025, a consulting session with a financial advisor to discuss the financial aspects of a sustainable art practice, and will participate as a juror for the following edition of the exhibition. The winner will also receive additional professional development and support. This consistent engagement over time makes *Pathways* unique and transformative among other art competitions. It hopes to nurture emerging artists and provide a pathway to success, which coincides with the core missions of both presenting institutions. The funding for the prize is generously provided by Mr. Carlos Malamud of Miami, FL.

The Fantastical Mundane: Selections from the Grasset-Linares Collection

During the 17th century, booming Dutch trade enabled the rise of a powerful middle class. This, along with the waning patronage system, led to the emergence of an art market that catered to the tastes of the new social class, making art available for display in private homes. This economic prosperity and growing demand for relatable imagery gave way to the Dutch Golden Age of painting, where marvelous still lifes, landscapes, and genre scenes became widely popular as they reflected the preferences and daily life of the new bourgeois society. The works in this exhibition illustrate the captivating charm of mundane subjects like flowers, fruits, and the natural terrain. The paintings' shimmering vibrance, paired with their compositional dynamism, captures the viewer's eye, and invites reflection on the everyday subject's underlying symbolism. Themes of the inevitability of time passing, the moral goodness of moderation, and the abundance of the natural world emerge from these stunning representations. On long-term loan from The Grasset-Linares Collection, this selection of ten paintings includes traditional Dutch floral

arrangements, rich banquet scenes, and detailed landscapes. These wondrous compositions of everyday Dutch subjects prompt the viewer to contemplate how works created for private consumption embody the crystallization of Dutch culture in the 17th century. This exhibition is guest curated by Sophia Foster '24, Fred W. Hicks Curatorial Fellow at the RMA.

Critical Reading: Book Arts in Dialogue with the Collection

This exhibition explores the ways in which text—whether literally or metaphorically—functions as image and vice versa. These works challenge our preconceptions about the act of reading by pushing experimental methods of communication and comprehension, asking viewers to take an active role in making sense of a text, even those

that are designed to provoke and confound. Including works by contemporary artists in various media, *Critical Reading* proposes an alternative approach to objects that address social, political and cultural issues, memory, and storytelling. Works by Matt Keagan and Rirkrit Tiravanija examine how the representation of language is layered with multiple interpretive possibilities; pieces by William Kentridge and Richard Baker consider the book as object while conveying the multivalent stories contained within them. Artists' books from the Rollins Book Arts Collection as well as by members of

CBAA (The Association for Book Art Education) activate dialogues across media with works from the museum's collection, providing opportunities to engage in critical reading from diverse perspectives. The synergy between this array of objects--paintings, drawings, videos, sculptures and artists' books--underscores the power of language in its multiple forms to challenge expectations about representation and content. As such, these art objects utilize our shared experiences with reading—both for pleasure and knowledge and our understanding of books as vessels for sharing expertise in an infinite array of topics. These works are uniquely positioned to interrogate cultural assumptions about books, and by extension, our experiences with reading & knowledge through a critical lens. *Critical Reading* is cocurated by Gisela Carbonell, Ph.D., Curator at the Rollins Museum of Art and Prof. Rachel Simmons, Art and Art History Department at Rollins College.

Open to the public year-round, its holdings include the only European Old Master paintings in the Orlando area, a sizeable American art collection, and a forward-thinking contemporary collection on view both at the Museum and The Alfond Inn at Rollins. Located a few blocks from campus, The Alfond Inn is a visionary philanthropic boutique hotel whose proceeds help fund student scholarships. In 1981, the museum became Florida's first accredited college museum by the American Association of Museums (currently the American Alliance of Museums) and continues today as one of only four AAM-accredited museums in greater Orlando.
